# CAMS Safety Testing

## ▶ What is CAMS Safety Testing?

CAMS Safety Testing is the drug testing program that will detect illicit drugs in CAMS licenced participants. As the name suggests, 'safety' is the main objective and this will be achieved by the exclusion of participants from CAMS permitted meetings if an illicit drug is detected in their sample.

CAMS Safety Testing will be administered by CAMS, with samples collected and analysed by an external service provider. The program has similar principles to police roadside drug testing.

## The Who, What, When, Where, How and Why of Safety Testing

#### Who can be tested?

Any CAMS licenced driver, co-driver, entrant, navigator or official (participants).

#### What happens if an illicit drug is detected in my sample?

You could be excluded from participating in the meeting and may also receive further penalties.

#### What happens if I refuse to undergo CAMS Safety Testing?

You'll be excluded from participating in the meeting and may also receive further penalties.

#### When and where will CAMS Safety Testing occur?

All year round, it could be any CAMS permitted meeting.

#### How will Safety Testing be conducted?

Saliva samples will be collected and 'screened' onsite while you wait.

#### How long does a test take?

About 15 minutes. CAMS will work with event organisers and participants to keep the impact to preparations as low as possible.

#### Why is CAMS doing this?

Safety. CAMS aims to provide the safest possible environment for all by excluding participants from meetings if they have an illicit drug detected in their sample.

## Illicit Drugs In Motor Sport

### Don't Risk Your Health And Reputation

By using illicit drugs, you can seriously impair the way your mind and body function. For motor sport participants, this can have a major impact on your performance and even puts the health and wellbeing of others, including the public at risk. Away from the track, illicit drug use can seriously damage your personal life including work and relationships.

## ▶ How Do Illicit Drugs Affect You?

Similar to being under the influence of alcohol, your skills and decision making ability are impaired by using illicit drugs. For instance, illicit drugs can:

- increase your nervousness and irritability making it hard to concentrate
- distort your judgement of time and distance
- cause dizziness or blurred vision
- slow down your decision making and response time
- impair your coordination

#### What's at risk?

If you use illicit drugs you are risking:

- vour health
- the safety of other participants and the public
- the reputation of you, your car club and CAMS
- your motor sport career aspirations
- your sponsorship deals
- the respect of your peers, family, friends and the motor sport community

#### **Remember:**

The best way to protect yourself and others from the impact of illicit drug use is to decide not to use them!

## Getting help

If you think you have a problem with drugs, or know someone who may have a problem with drugs, start talking. Talk to a counsellor, a health professional or someone else you can trust, such as a friend or family member.
